

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

NEW SHOES




Downtown Fox saw a sign in a window.

THE HAUNTED HOUSE


Fox walked by
the amusement park.


"Too bad I don't have money

"Welcome to the Haunted House!" cried a skeleton.




"I'm coming to get you!" cried a ghost.

"That's no place for little kids!


I quit!"

On Homer's Hill


Fox picked up speed.

Louise went to the vet's.


Doctor Jane opened the box.

Fox knocked on Mrs. O'Hara's door.


"It's about time," said Mrs. O'Hara.

She opened the box.






Back at the pizza parlor

I'll think of something."




Just then he came to a furniture store.

"I can't give you a job."




"Maybe you can," said Fox.

"I can't see," said Carmen.


"Lift me up."
